## Waiting in the Wings Pat Camerena

Title IX turns forty this year. Many positive changes have been made for women in sports fields but more are needed.

Major league baseball teams for 2012 are in the playoffs and soon there will be another World Series underway for Americans to cheer. However there are very few women who have become Major League broadcasters or public address announcers over the years. What gives? Women major league broadcasters are still a rarity. According to Deadspin.com left handed softball pitcher Michele Smith from Oklahoma State University became the first female analyst for a national baseball broadcast recently for a Dodgers-Braves game. However this two times Olympic gold medalist and softball Hall of Fame member went on to play softball professionally in Japan, not getting a long term place as a broadcaster or public address announcer. Many women would-be broadcasters although generally well received are known for making many bloggers angry just with the sound of their voices or even their opinions. Young Chrissy Scaffedi in Wisconsin is one of only three women among the 190 full time PA announcers working for major and minor-league teams this year. This area of sports involvement seems to still be an over-whelming male field since PA announcers in baseball were first used in 1929. Leslie Saunders was the first African-American woman PA announcer for the Boston Red Sox from 1994-1998. Renel Brooks-Moon has been the longest tenured female PA announcer with the SF Giants since 2000. She has even had her own bobble-head doll! Renel is a local gal, a Woodside High graduate and child of two educators. She has been elected to the Multi-Ethnic Sports Hall of Fame this year as well as having earned several life-time achievement awards from various sports organizations. Currently there are three full time time female PA announcers among the many Major League teams Scaffidi, Adrienne Roberson, and our own Renel. What seems to count is getting your foot in the door and hanging in there. Some women have pursued television careers instead or using broadcasting as a step up to other front office positions. More women are certain to enter this field over the coming years.

## **Playing Now Paula Campbell**

DO NOT MISS <u>The Normal Heart</u>. This revival of Larry Kramer's 1985 play about AIDS, and the failure of government and media to recognize the growing danger until it was too late, is heartrending, infuriating, and a brilliant night of theatre.

Kramer, a well-known gay journalist, novelist, playwright, was appalled at both the lack of government financial support and the almost non-existent press coverage in the early days of AIDS – the play is set from 1981-1984. In 1981 he founded the Gay Men's Health Collective, which he planned as an activist group. Sadly, the members were as afraid of being labeled gay (remember this was 81-

84) as they were of contracting AIDS (which then was an automatic death sentence) and shunned the publicity activism would bring. Death was preferable to being known as gay. Kramer was ousted from the group for being too abrasive, and the GMHC become only a support group for AIDS Kramer founded ACT-UP in 1987, an patients. which demonstrated, activist group rallied, marched, (once even stopped traffic on the George Washington Bridge) and finally got much needed publicity, and the funds that came with it, for further AIDS research and treatment options.

I saw the original 1985 production at the Public Theatre in New York, and came away reeling with fury and sadness. One of the things I remember most are the posters in the theatre, changed every few days, that gave the day's date, and the number dead. The current production makes use of technology not available in 1985. Lists of the dead are projected onto the stage walls, later onto the walls of the theatre itself that are near the stage, and finally on to all the walls of the theatre. When the play ends the audience is surrounded by names of the dead. "Powerful" does not begin to describe the effect.

The play is fiercely directed by George C. Wolfe, and performed with heartfelt emotion by all the exemplary cast. Patrick Breen plays Ned Weeks, (the Larry Kramer character). His outraged performance equals that of Joel Grey, (taking over the role from Brad Davis) who I saw in the role. The entire cast is outstanding, with special kudos to Nick Mennell, whose monologue about taking his dying lover back home to his mother in Phoenix, left me and most of the audience in tears – the pilot refused to take off with the sick man on board so a new pilot had to be found, the plane was met when it landed with police in hazmat gear to take him to the hospital, and finally when he died no undertaker was willing to touch the body. Do my readers remember those days – I certainly do.

It's important not to become complacent – AIDS is still a major killer worldwide. When the audience leaves the theatre they're handed a two page letter from Larry Kramer, titled Please Know, dated June, 2012. He points out that there have been 35 million

deaths worldwide, and that during the time it took to see the play, there were 41 new deaths. He cites the still insufficient funding, the lack of any actual cure, the lack of organizational coordination of any kind to find a cure. He points out that the research is done by drug companies, whose interest is best served by keeping patients alive, but never curing them. He writes in part:

Please know that after all this time the amount of money being spent to find a cure is still miniscule, still almost invisible, still impossible to locate in any national health budget, and still totally uncoordinated.

<u>The Normal Heart</u> is an important document of our times. It is also a gripping, edge of your seat, brilliant evening of theatre. To repeat -- <u>DO NOT MISS IT.</u>

## **Public Policy Notes**

Highlights: the **Status of Women Annual Report** for Fiscal Year 2011-2012.

The Department worked collaboratively with the Department of Emergency Management to implement new codes to identify child abuse, elder abuse, and stalking calls.

2012 Girls Report, "An Update on Girls in San Francisco: A Decade of Success and Challenges," was publicly released in June, followed by a Commission hearing in which more than 20 representatives which adopted 4 key recommendations, that included to increase girls participation in STEM. I've initiated the process to get AAUW-SF TechTrek recognized as a key City resource for girls participation in STEM.

Efforts in the Gender Equality Principles Initiative engaged many leading Fortune 500 companies headquartered in the Bay Area. A self-assessment tool benchmarks actions companies can take to create gender equality.

2011 Gender Analyses of City Commissions and Boards found that commission appointments represent the City's demographics, while Board appointments of women do not.

Violence Against Women Prevention & Intervention (VAW) received public commitment from the Mayor to maintain current funding levels with 2% cost of doing business increase for partner agencies for the next two years. Domestic Violence policy reform and the Family Violence Council

continue to monitor, advocate for and implement policies.

5th World Conference on Women Steering Committee: this is a grassroots effort; key activity was drafting a position statement that advocates that there be a conference in 2015, and that there be no amendments to the 1995 Beijing Platform.

The American Association of University Women (AAUW), founded in 1881, is the nation's leading organization advocating equity for women and girls. Its national membership of 100,000 seeks to advance equity for women and girls through advocacy, education, and research. People of every race, creed, age, sexual orientation, national origin, and level of physical ability are invited to join.

AAUW California was launched in San Francisco in 1886 and began lobbying immediately. It remains the state's most active and diverse organization for women with 14,000 members in more than 150 branches, plus 6,000 members-at-large.



AAUW advances equity for women and girls through advocacy, philanthropy, education, and research

#### **Marie Curie & AAUW**

The year was 1919. Europe had been ravaged by World War I and radium was far too expensive for a scientist of modest means to afford for experiments. This was true even forone as famous as Madame Marie Curie. As a result, her groundbreaking research had reached a virtual standstill. Then the AAUW came to the rescue. Members from Maine to California helped raise an astonishing \$156,413, enabling Madame Curie to purchase one gram of radium and continue her experiments that helped her create the field of nuclear chemistry and forever change the course of science. Madame Curie received the Nobel Prize for her work, but was not admitted to the French Academie des Sciences until she won an incredible second Nobel Prize...all because she was a woman. More than 75 years later, there are still only three women members.

#### **Educational Foundation**

In 1873, a prominent Boston physician, Dr. E.H. Clarke, wrote a book arguing that too much study would give women brain fever and render their children sickly, if they were to have them at all.

The Association of Collegiate Alumnae (AAUW's chief predecessor) fought this contention in 1885 and won, by gathering data from its members to show that they had suffered no ill health from their college and postgraduate education. In 1888, the Western Association of Collegiate Alumnae (founded here in San Francisco) made educational history by establishing the first graduate fellowship for women (given to Vassar graduate Ida Street).

California is still the largest contributor, enabling the Educational Foundation to award nearly \$3 million in grants to women at the dissertation or doctoral level, and to those pursuing career-related or community-based projects.

## **Legal Advocacy Fund**

Founded in 1981, the Legal Advocacy Fund (LAF) works to achieve equity for women in higher education by recognizing indicative efforts to improve the climate for women on campus; by offering assistance to women faculty, staff, and students who have grievances against colleges and universities; and by supporting sex discrimination lawsuits.

The LAF Board only approves support of cases which are currently involved in litigation, and that have the potential to set legal precedent.

The Legal Advocacy Fund's annual Progress in Equity Award recognizes indicative and replicable college and university programs.
